## Four on shotgun charge

FOUR Belfast teenagers appeared at Belfast Magistrate's Court yesterday charged with having a shotgun and five cartridges and other suspicious circumstances. Samson Road last Friday.

They were remanded in custody until Wednesday.

A detective chief inspector told the court that a considerable quantity of arms and ammunition were involved and that the charges arose out of the investigation into the killing of the Constable Lagan, who was shot at Rathcoole last year.

He said the incident had brought a sense of shock to the community and it would be seen as cowardly act against all who sought peace and harmony.
